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SECTION 4 · FIRST AID MEASURES

FIRST AID PROCEDURES:

Eye Contact: Flush eyes with plenty of water for at least 15 minutes. Seek medical attention.

Skin Contact: Wash with soap and water. Seek medical attention if irritation develops.

Inhalation: If inhaled, remove to fresh air. If not breathing, give artificial respiration. Seek medical attention if symptoms appear.

Ingestion: Do NOT induce vomiting. Never give anything by mouth to an unconscious person. Rinse mouth with water.

Seek medical attention.

SECTION 5 · FIRE FIGHTING MEASURES

Suitable Extinguishing media: Use water spray, alcohol-resistant foam, dry chemical or carbon dioxide.

Hazardous combustion products: Oxides of carbon and various hydrocarbons

Fire Fighting Procedures: As in any fire, wear a self-contained breathing apparatus in pressure-demand, MSHA/NIOSH (approved or equivalent), and full protective gear.

Unusual Fire and Explosion Hazards: Containers can build up pressure if exposed to heat and/or fire. Use water spray to keep fire-exposed containers cool. Containers may explode in the heat of a fire. Vapors will form an explosive mixture with air. Vapors will travel to a source of ignition and flash back.

SECTION 6 - ACCIDENTAL RELEASE and DISPOSAL MEASURES

Spills: Use personal protective equipment. Avoid breathing vapors, mist or gas. Ensure adequate ventilation. Remove all sources of ignition. Evacuate personnel to safe areas. Beware of vapors accumulating to form explosive concentrations. Vapors can accumulate in low areas.

Prevent further leakage or spillage if safe to do so. Do not let product enter drains.

Contain spillage, salvage as much recyclable material as possible, then collect with an electrically protected vacuum cleaner or by wet-brushing and place in a container for disposal according to regulations.

SECTION 7 · STORAGE AND HANDLING

Handling: Do not get in eyes, on skin or on clothing. Do not breathe vapors or mists. Keep container closed and tightly sealed when not in use. Avoid contact with skin and eyes.

Keep away from sources of ignition - No smoking. Take measures to prevent the buildup of electrostatic charge. Storage: This material is a static accumulator. Use non-sparking tools. Store in a cool, dry, ventilated area, away from incompatible substances. Store only in approved properly labeled containers. Containers should be grounded and bonded.

SECTION 8 · EXPOSURE CONTROLS AND PERSONAL PROTECTION

Engineering Controls: Provide explosion-proof ventilation or other engineering controls to keep the airborne concentrations of vapor or mists below the applicable workplace exposure limits indicated below.

Exposure Limits: Butanol 20 ppm ACGIH; 50 ppm OSHA

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE):

Eyes: Wear appropriate protective eyeglasses or chemical safety goggles as described by OSHA's eye and face protection regulations in 29 CFR 1910.133.

Skin: If prolonged or repeated skin contact is likely, wear appropriate protective gloves.

Clothing: Selection of protective clothing depends on work conditions, potential exposure conditions and may include gloves, boots, suits and other protective items.

Respirators: Where adequate ventilation is not available an approved respirator must be worn. Respirator selection, use and maintenance should be in accordance with the requirements of OSHA Respiratory Protection Standard, 29 CFR 1920.134. In confined areas, use a self-contained breathing apparatus.
